11.1 Research on Sustainable Cities and Communities

11.1.1 Sustainable Cities and Communities: Field-Weighted Citation Impact (FWCI)

The scientific output of Yarmouk University in the 11th Sustainable Development Goal, which is related to "Sustainable Cities and Communities," includes more than 235 research papers according to the SCOUPUS database. The university works on encouraging and motivating researchers to publish in reputable scientific journals to achieve this goal by providing innovative and applicable solutions, aiming to contribute to sustainability.

11.2.1 Sustainable Cities and Communities: FWCI

Yarmouk University works on enhancing its role in sustainability through its research that supports sustainable cities and communities, using the Field-Weighted Citation Impact (FWCI) index. This index allows the university to compare the citation impact of its research with other fields in the same discipline at a global level. The university's FWCI has surpassed the average value (1.0), exceeding the global average, which strengthens its research and practical standing in supporting research related to the Sustainable Development Goals, particularly in areas such as clean energy, green mobility, and water resource management.

11.1.3 Sustainable Cities and Communities: publications

The university supports and encourages academic research in the field of climate change, and it also recognizes the importance of creating a sustainable environment within the campus. Therefore, one of the university's priorities has been to make its campus a clean one that adheres to environmental standards and maintains greenery. We address the topic of environmental sustainability from all angles





































by reducing the carbon footprint and energy consumption, supporting environmental education and research, implementing waste recycling systems on campus, and organizing activities to raise public awareness of environmental issues.

11.2 Support of arts and heritage

Yarmouk University is a fundamental pillar in shaping the cultural, heritage, and artistic identity of Jordan. It has prioritized arts and heritage within its academic and cultural framework. In 1980, the university established the Department of Fine Arts, which was the first department in Jordan for higher education to teach four art disciplines: visual arts (painting and drawing, sculpture, ceramics, and photography). This department later developed into the Faculty of Fine Arts with its four departments: the Department of Design and Applied Arts (graphic design, interior design, industrial design, fashion design), the Department of Fine Arts (crafts, drawing and painting, ceramics, sculpture, photography, graphic design, and printing), the Department of Music (musical performance), and the Department of Drama (film production, performing arts). The faculty offers a bachelor's degree in the mentioned fields, in addition to two master's degree programs in music and fine arts. All academic programs in the faculty are accredited by the Higher Education Accreditation and Quality Assurance Commission. The faculty works on developing students' skills and enhancing their creativity by providing an interactive learning environment that combines both theoretical and practical education. Specialized professors contribute to preparing a new generation of artists and creators who can contribute to the development of the artistic movement both within Jordan and abroad.

Additionally, the faculty organizes numerous annual art exhibitions, allowing students to showcase their artwork to the public. The university encourages these exhibitions as an opportunity for direct interaction with art-loving audiences, as well as for exchanging ideas with professional artists. Most of the prominent Jordanian artists, who hold positions locally and regionally, are graduates of this faculty.

In 1984, Yarmouk University established the Institute of Archaeology and Anthropology as a research and teaching center in the fields of archaeology, anthropology, and epigraphy. Since its inception, the institute has continuously expanded to cover various areas related to archaeology and heritage, such as heritage resource management, preservation of archaeological materials, archaeological surveying, and museum studies. This expansion led the university to transform the institute into a faculty at the beginning of the 2003/2004 academic year.

The Faculty of Archaeology and Anthropology includes four academic departments: the Department of Archaeology, the Department of Anthropology, the Department of Epigraphy, and the Department of Heritage Resource Preservation and Management. Additionally, the faculty has several units, including the Jordanian Heritage Museum, the Laboratories Unit, and the Deir Alla Archaeological Studies Station. The faculty also has two academic chairs: the Mahmoud Al-Ghoul Chair for the Study of Arabian Peninsula Civilization and its Writings, and the Samir Shama Chair for Numismatics and Islamic Civilization.

The faculty offers several academic programs at both the undergraduate and master's levels in the general fields of heritage. It grants bachelor's degrees in archaeology, anthropology, and heritage preservation and management, as well as master's degrees in archaeology, anthropology, epigraphy, and heritage preservation and management.

One of the prominent features of Yarmouk University is the "Center for the Study of Popular Heritage," which aims to preserve Jordanian and Arab cultural heritage through research and study. The center works on documenting popular heritage and preserving folklore and traditional arts that express the cultural identity of the community. 11.2.2 Public access to libraries

The Hussayniya Library at Yarmouk University is one of the largest libraries in the Middle East and serves as a key reference for students, researchers, institutions, and the local community. It is open to the public free of charge. The library hosts conferences, cultural and artistic seminars, book exhibitions, and film screenings. New book arrivals are announced through the "New Arrivals" program.

The new building of the library was inaugurated in 2002, with a total area of 17,450 m². The structure consists of six floors, featuring colored stone cladding with geometric shapes, glass facades, and includes all civil, architectural, and electromechanical works. The building is equipped with protection systems, a self-extinguishing fire system, book protection devices, and a central computer network. It also houses lecture halls and reading rooms. The total cost of the library building is 4.5 million Jordanian dinars.

11.2.3 Public access to museums

Yarmouk University houses several museums specializing in Jordanian heritage, including the Natural History Museum and the Coin Museum, all of which are open to the public for free. The university is







































considered one of the most important destinations for local school trips and serves as a main hub for researchers and visitors from abroad. In 1984, the university established the Institute of Archaeology and Anthropology as a research and teaching center in the fields of archaeology, anthropology, and epigraphy. Since then, the institute has continuously expanded to cover various areas related to archaeology and heritage, such as heritage resource management, archaeological conservation, archaeological measurement, and museum studies, leading the university to convert the institute into a faculty at the start of the academic year 2003/2004.

The Faculty of Archaeology and Anthropology includes four academic departments: the Department of Archaeology, the Department of Anthropology, the Department of Epigraphy, and the Department of Heritage Resource Conservation and Management. The faculty also contains several units, including the Jordanian Heritage Museum, the Laboratories Unit, and the Deir Alla Archaeological Studies Station. Additionally, the faculty has two academic chairs: the Mahmoud Al-Ghoul Chair for the Study of Arabian Peninsula Civilizations and Writings, and the Samir Shama Chair for Coinage and Islamic Civilization.

The faculty offers a variety of academic programs at both the undergraduate and master's levels in general heritage fields. It grants bachelor's degrees in archaeology, anthropology, and heritage resource conservation and management, as well as master's degrees in archaeology, anthropology, epigraphy, and heritage resource conservation and management.

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11.2.4 Public access to green spaces

Yarmouk University provides the local community and the public with free access to its green spaces. The university is located in the city center, covering an area of 2,692,515.180 m². The environmental





































campus is an integral part of the university campus as a whole. A plot of land covering 50,000 m² is dedicated to an ecological area for planting fruit trees, while 80,000 m² of green spaces are distributed between buildings, forming a natural mosaic within the campus. These spaces include pathways designed for student and staff movement, as well as for the public and local community to engage in walking activities. Additionally, the university's sports fields are available for public use. The community also participates in special celebrations, such as Arbor Day, to raise awareness about environmental care.

The center works on documenting popular heritage and preserving folklore and traditional arts that reflect the cultural identity of society. The center collaborates with local and international institutions to organize workshops and conferences to raise awareness about the importance of heritage preservation.

The center also contributes to conducting field studies and scientific research that explore aspects of intangible heritage, such as folk tales, traditional songs, and folk dances. In this way, the center helps document and revive these traditions for future generations.

Yarmouk University contributes significantly to archaeological excavations and the restoration and conservation of heritage and archaeological sites in Jordan, including sites like Tell Al-Asara. The university has been recognized as one of the top universities globally in the fields of "Tourism Management, Hospitality, and Archaeology."

The "Newton-Khalidi" project is a research partnership between Jordan and the United Kingdom aimed at enhancing cooperation in the fields of science and technology, in recognition of the Jordanian scientist Dr. Osama Khalidi, who played a prominent role in educating generations and advancing scientific research in the Arab world. The project seeks to build scientific research capabilities in Jordan by funding projects that address vital challenges such as renewable energy, cultural heritage preservation, water security, agricultural technology, and food security.

It includes financial support of up to 3.5 million pounds, alongside providing training opportunities and skill development for Jordanian researchers, contributing to the achievement of sustainable development in the country. Additionally, the project promotes international collaboration and supports the building of infrastructure for scientific policies that go beyond traditional approaches to enhance







































innovation and sustainable scientific research in Jordan.

The Department of Archaeology and Anthropology at Yarmouk University has initiated excavations at the Tel Al-Asara archaeological site as part of its academic programs. The excavations aim to train students in excavation techniques, documentation, conservation, and report writing, while also contributing to the discovery and study of archaeological remains. Dr. Maher Tarboush and Dr. Hussein Al-Sabbah are overseeing the project, which involves a specialized team from the university. The goal is to raise local awareness of the site's historical significance and prepare it for future tourism. Tel Al-Asara, located 15 km south of Irbid, shows evidence of settlement from the Bronze, Iron, and Classical Ages, with tombs, city walls, and residential remains already discovered. These excavations reflect the university's commitment to preserving and studying archaeological heritage.

11.3.1 Arts and heritage expenditure

The Jordanian Heritage Museum at the university is a primary example of this commitment. 11.4 Sustainable practices

Yarmouk University has taken it upon itself to adopt sustainable practices, beginning with the use of solar energy to power its activities. The university produces approximately 10.5 gigawatt-hours of solar energy annually, with the goal of achieving zero carbon emissions by 2023. To achieve this, the following measures have been implemented:

Review and Development of Sustainable Development Policies: The university has reviewed and developed policies related to sustainable development and ways to achieve it.

Introduction of Sustainable Development Courses: The university has introduced numerous courses on sustainable development, with a total of 30 academic courses focused on this subject.

Awareness Seminars on Sustainability: The university has organized awareness seminars on various forms of sustainable development.

Maintenance and Preparation of Pathways for Students and Staff: The university has equipped and maintained pathways for students and staff, integrating solar cells as permanent protection stations for their movement.

Use of University Buses for Organized Student Transport: The university provides buses for students to







































move around the campus in an organized manner.

Classroom Proximity to Reduce Vehicle Movement: The university has designed classroom locations to reduce the need for vehicle movement within the campus.

Incentives for Environmentally-Friendly Vehicles: The university offers preferential deals for staff to replace their fuel-powered cars with environmentally-friendly ones, with 75% of staff vehicles now being eco-friendly.

Gradual Replacement of University Vehicles with Eco-Friendly Ones: The university is gradually replacing its vehicles with environmentally-friendly models.

Consolidating Official Staff Trips: The university consolidates official staff trips to reduce the number of vehicles used by having them travel in a single vehicle instead of multiple ones.

LED Lighting Upgrade: The university has replaced 80% of its lighting with energy-efficient LED systems.

11.4.1 Sustainable practices targets

The university adopts a policy of not allowing cars on campus by students, except in exceptional cases, especially for people with disabilities, which do not exceed 0.02%. The Yarmouk University campus is considered environmentally friendly, and all campus locations are suitable for walking and easy transportation, where many individuals and families from the local community walk during the evening hours through free access. It also contains public facilities (shelters and restrooms).

Ensuring that classrooms are located close to each other to reduce vehicle movement within the university.

Offering preferential deals to university employees to replace their fuel-powered vehicles with environmentally friendly ones, with 75% of staff vehicles being eco-friendly.

Gradually replacing the university's vehicles with eco-friendly vehicles.

Consolidating official trips undertaken by staff into one vehicle instead of using multiple vehicles.



































11.4.6 Pedestrian priority on campus

Yarmouk University places great importance on the safety and comfort of its students and faculty members. In recent years, the university has developed strategic plans to make its campus a pedestrian-friendly environment. This approach contributes to improving the quality of life on campus, enhancing





































safety, and promoting healthy habits within the university community through:

Designing Safe Pedestrian Pathways: The university has redesigned and developed several walkways and paths within the campus to be exclusively safe for pedestrians. These pathways connect the college buildings and various campus facilities, making it easier to access all locations without the need for vehicles. The walkways are equipped with non-slip surfaces and nighttime lighting to ensure pedestrian safety.

Reducing Vehicle Movement within the Campus: Vehicles are allowed to enter the campus only during specific and limited times, helping to reduce congestion and create a more comfortable environment for .pedestrians. The university also provides special parking outside the campus to limit the use of cars

Installing Directional and Regulatory Signage: The university has equipped all pedestrian pathways with clear directional signs to mark the designated routes and guide pedestrians to different buildings and destinations within the campus.

Providing an Accessible Environment for People with Disabilities: The university has equipped pedestrian walkways with special paths that facilitate movement for individuals with mobility impairments. The university is committed to applying design standards that ensure easy access for students and visitors from all groups.

Enhancing Safety and Surveillance: The university has designated surveillance systems to monitor traffic movements within the campus and detect any violations affecting pedestrian priority. These campaigns include guidelines on proper behavior when using designated walkways and emphasize the importance of cooperation to create a safe environment on campus.

Yarmouk University Research Team Conducts Geophysical Survey and Aerial Photography in Northern Badia"

A scientific team from Yarmouk University's Department of Earth and Environmental Sciences, including the Geophysical Studies Laboratory and the Applied Geoinformatics Laboratory in the Faculty of Science, carried out a three-day geophysical survey, aerial photography, and topographic mapping using a drone in selected areas of northern Jordan's Badia region. The research effort aimed to determine groundwater depths in the studied areas, supporting studies by the Hashemite Royal Court to develop development projects for the communities in Jordan's Badia.

The research team consisted of Dr. Rashid Abdul Karim Jaradat, Professor of Applied Geophysics, Dr. Abdullah Mustafa Al-Rawabdeh, Professor of Geomatics Engineering and Aerial Imaging, along with graduate students Omar Salah Al-Najjar, Osama Muhammad Al-Tarawneh, Abdulrahman Sateh Al-Saleh, and Bashar Majed Ababneh.

This survey also marked the first research mission for the newly added drone to the Applied Geomatics Laboratory at the Faculty of Science at Yarmouk University. The drone, equipped with specialized cameras and a 3D laser scanning device, is designed to support both teaching and research activities for faculty and students at the university.

The university participates in promoting projects that contribute to sustainability in local communities.





































In 2023, it launched the "Clean and Energy-Efficient Public Building" project in partnership with the Irbid Municipality. The project aims to improve environmental quality and reduce traffic congestion by promoting green mobility and integrating the community in designing innovative environmental solutions, thereby enhancing air quality and reducing carbon emissions..

This includes using environmentally friendly materials, efficient waste management, and the installation of smart ventilation and lighting systems.

A team of students from the Civil Engineering Department at Yarmouk University's Al-Hijawi College of Engineering Technology has developed a concrete mix that absorbs solar light during the day and reflects it at night, emitting light for up to 8 hours.















































Encouraging Research and Development: Through its academic partnerships, the university aims to encourage its students and faculty to conduct research related to the development of sustainable building and design methods, contributing to the creation of new solutions that serve the educational sector and other sectors.

11.4.9 Building on brownfield sites

Yarmouk University adopts a policy of rehabilitating abandoned sites in Jordan, where the faculties of Engineering, Architecture, and Fine Arts contribute by providing designs and plans for the rehabilitation of these sites in innovative and sustainable ways. This includes:

The Faculty of Engineering has created training programs in which students participate to work on live models of abandoned sites. Advanced technology and engineering software applications are used to develop solutions that serve the environment of the site and enhance its economic and tourist appeal. Yarmouk University established a station, affiliated with the Al-Manasir Group, on vacant land in the southwestern part of the university since 1976, covering an area of 3 dunams. The station will generate 114,000 Jordanian dinars annually for the university, and the building and fuel station will be transferred to the university after 20 years
